A visit with Mr. Robert Wehle By Mike Barlow

To get the most out of my hunting time I am doing things with more thought and planning than I have in the past. I want to be more active in the sport so that my children, as well as other children, will continue to have the same opportunities that I have enjoyed. This past weekend I joined Bob Carr and Harold Ridgeway for a trip to Midway, Alabama to visit Mr. Robert Wehle at the Elhew Kennels. I'm just like you, I look at the name Wehle and stand amazed at the impact one man can have had on the "dog world" as we know it. Anticipating this visit made the time drag by and was cause for countless "what if" questions as the meeting day approached. However, I can say without reservation that our morning with Mr. Wehle was worth the wait and made me proud to be counted among those individuals that that have trained and used his pointers. The lifelong pursuit of building one of the premier dog strains in birddog history has not impeded his ability to also excel as a wildlife sculptor, a writer, and a custodian of Mother Nature's bounty. Over the last thirty-one years Mr. Wehle has transformed 1500 acres of beautiful Alabama woodland into 1500 acres of showpiece quality land that is a haven for wildlife and a perfect place for his breeding and training facility.

Upon our arrival we were invited into his home where we settled in his den and almost immediately launched into "birddog talk". We had questions and Mr. Wehle freely gave us his thoughts. It was a wonderful opportunity for three regular guys to ask those questions that we'd always wondered about. It seemed that the time flew as we discussed everything from canine genetic theory to how the famous pointer Snakefoot is the only dog in the kennel that is allowed to bark and the other dogs don't challenge his privilege. After talking in the house for a considerable time, Mr. Wehle invited us to see his kennels. At the kennels I finally got to see the proud gentleman of the Elhew pointer world, Snakefoot. He is getting up in years but his strength and personality shine like a beacon as he holds audience, yet again, for "his" visiting fan club members. He surveyed us as if to acknowledge that, yes, he was a most noble canine but we could squeeze in a rub or two and he wouldn't tell. As we made our way around the kennel and the outbuildings I realized that our host was much more than I had first envisioned. True, he is a legendary birddog breeder, and he is an accomplished artist and writer, but he is first and foremost a teacher. His accomplishments, great though they may be, are all a form of sharing with others and teaching what he had picked up along life's journey. I found Mr. Wehle to be a keen observer of the world around him but it's what he does with these observations that make him special. He has the ability to point out what he notices and inspire others to open their eyes and study their own respective worlds.

I feel that Bob, Harold, and I were very fortunate to have had the opportunity to visit with Mr. Wehle. I could write page after page about this trip but this is a small newsletter and space is a consideration. On a positive note, Jeff Gardner, the ranger in charge of the Talladega National Forest, spoke recently to Q. U. He is an active quail hunter and has a brother, Dennis that has been a member of A.Q.H. for several years.

Jeff presented us with a real opportunity to help piggyback quail habitat improvement on top of the federal program to restore habitat for the Red Cockaded Woodpecker. The QU people were excited about this idea and so were the members of AQH when we discussed it at our meeting.
