They made the adventure a pléasure to behold as we swiftly moved over hill and dale to catch each point at the perfect time.

During the day I'd glance over at Maggie and she always had the look of a girl that was having the time of her life. For those that know Maggie from our club events, you know that her first love is birddogs and her second love is anything to do with horses. She was having a ball as we rode after the dogs. Seeing them run over the beautiful farmland with no apparent

We closed out the morning with Mr. Miller running a young dog, a very young dog, who ran as if he had experience waaaaaay beyond his years. He ran just as if he as one of the "big dogs" and his every move was impressive. I'm sure we'll be hearing about this young one before long.

Returning to the barn, Maggie and I had a chance to see two of the most famous dogs in America. Maggie and I were introduced to Dateline and White Powder. Of course, when we were outside their pens they sorta looked like regular birddogs but then something really impressive happened. Mr. Miller opened one of the pens and off went Dateline in a flash. Mr. Miller was in mid-sentence and never, I repeat NEVER, blinked as this champion (that is spelled expensive) birddog burst out the barn door for parts unknown. After what seemed like minutes, though actually it was just seconds, Mr. Miller called once
